



The individual annual appraisal report filled by each teacher is evaluated by the Head of the respective Department and then forwarded to the Principal.

Curricular

Planning and Implementation

The Department of Mathematics & Statistics began with an innovative practice under the theme 'Uniformity'. This practice was adopted to track the teaching plan prepared at the start of the academic year. With the semester system in place, the teaching days are not enough to include revision and paper solution. Hence to ensure the syllabus is complete in time with the provision for revision this practice was planned and executed throughout the academic year. The purpose of this practice was also to ensure that all members in the department follow a uniform pattern of solving examples of various difficulty levels. The process of uniformity is yet to evolve to conclusive outcome, yet this exercise helped in tracking the teaching plan. The department also took measures to cut on paper use by displaying the tutorial sheets on notice board as well as solving them on board in tutorial lectures.

Immersive Learning

An experiment in immersive teaching methodology was conducted by the department of Business Communication. In keeping with the theme of this year- Inculcating reading Habits - a **Conference on 'Reading'** was organised on 22nd February, in the college auditorium. It was a conference organised 'By the students, For the students' that encouraged them to take up reading and also acquainted them with the benefits of 'Reading' which is the need of the hour. The following were the eight Student Experts who threw light on the corresponding topics:

- Ms. Bhagti Pawar: E-Books versus Traditional Books.
- Mr. Shubham Sharma: How to Inculcate Reading Habits.
- Ms. Reha Coutinho: The Epitome of Our Success Reading.
- Mr. Nimesh Tamka: Reading Addas in Mumbai.
- Ms. Sonu Chaturvedi: How to get Richer?
- Mr. Shibin Thomas: Will E-books Replace Printed Books?

Sixty seven students attended this conference. This conference helped the students to imbibe the true spirit of the habit that they intended to inculcate in others. The students who learn about organising a conference in their Business Communication first year curriculum went through the entire process of arranging and hosting a conference on their own. The morale of the students who gave presentations was boosted as they became aware of their potential.

Experiential learning

To explore & develop the passion for business among students, especially the students of Bachelor in Management Studies, the *Budding Entrepreneurs Association* organized a **'Business Fair'** in the college foyer area. In all there were 25 stalls put up which included merchandise like Cosmetics, Apparels, Eatables, Accessories and skills like Henna, Tattoo making and Hair styling etc. The students of Junior, Degree and Professional courses participated with great enthusiasm as businesspersons & customers. This venture was arranged keeping the learners' all round development in perspective and aimed to inculcate in our students managerial and entrepreneurial skills.

The business acumen of our students was judged by experts and prizes were accorded certificates of 'Best Managers', 'Best Stall', Highest sales Stall', etc. Cash prizes were also in place as encouragement.

A special stall was put up by the learners of TYBMS as a social initiative. The students bought and sold the articles made by 'Punarvas' an NGO that helps mentally challenged students". They contributed the revenue of the day to Punarvas. They were awarded the 'Social Entrepreneur' Certificate along with a cash prize. The students who contributed in making this event possible were also awarded appreciation certificates.



I. Feedback by students given after they completed their course.



99% of students answered this question. 50% found the syllabus 'Adequate' and 5% students found it 'Inadequate'.




2. Students' background for benefiting from the course was checked and 59% students reported that their background for benefiting from course is 'Adequate' and 8% students found it 'Inadequate'.



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
3. Difficulty level of the course

54% students thought that the course is conceptually 'Manageable'. 10% of students thought the course to be 'Difficult' and 4% students thought the course was 'Very difficult'.






5. Library facility for the course.

6. Availability of prescribed readings pertaining to the course.






8. Communication skills of the teachers


9. Teacher encouragement in class.

10. Teaching Methods used in class








13. Effectiveness of the Internal assessment system



14. Effect of the internal assessment on course grade.





15. Discussion of assignments.





17. Regarding helpfulness of Course outline





19. Personal interaction with teachers





20. Opportunity to work in small groups work



21. Experts invited to address students




37% parents were satisfied with Support material provided.

Graphical representation of individual parameters:













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Combined graphical presentation of Parents' Feedback:




III. PLACEMENT FEEDBACK REPORT



1. Feedback about the INFRASTRUCTURE of the college


From the diagram it is observed that out of the 10 companies that came to the college 70% were satisfied with the infrastructure provided by the college management and really appreciated the support of the staff.


The participating companies were happy with the interactive sessions they had with the students and gave a very positive feedback. They gave excellent rating.



3. Feedback about ICT (Information and communication Technology) FACILITY of the college.



INNOVATIVE PROCESSES ADOPTED BY THE INSTITUTION IN TEACHING AND LEARNING

Use of ICT	Lectures are enhanced by the use of PowerPoint presentations, overhead projector, etc. Videos were shown regarding Personality development for SYBFM students in language lab. Videos on the working of stock market were shown during lectures (Equity Markets) for SYBFM students. Lectures make use of audio-visual wherever necessary.
Group Discussions	In management subjects like Business Communication, Principles of Management etc. learners are put through group discussion on all latest current issues and trends so as to increase their learning experience and make them develop their interactive and communication skills for overall personality development.
Live Projects	Live models of projects on going eco-friendly initiatives were displayed by the students.The live exhibitions included sale of eco-friendly goods, Herbal home remedies through herbal plants, etc. A photo exhibition was organized at the college campus. The exhibition showcased the contrasts created due to pollution – the beautiful pristine environment as against the havoc wreaked upon nature through human activity. An appeal to all the visitors was made that things that we adore today won't be there tomorrow if we are not caretakers of the same.

Industrial visit for BFM students was conducted through Seed programe to Silvasa on 18th January. BSCIT students visited Jaipur from 4th Jan 16 to 8th Jan 16. Students visited CompuCom Company.

Court Visits	Forty Five students of Prahladrai Dalmia Lions College of Commerce and Economics were taken for a visit to the Mumbai High Court on 26th February. The actual visit commenced with the witnessing of ongoing trials at the various sub division courts where various cases were put before the judge. Here the students got an insight into the manner in which cases were conducted in respect of Civil, Criminal and Matrimonial matters. Judge Karandikar and Advocate Shinde elaborated upon the affairs of the court and the manner in which proceedings are carried out, enumerating the manner in which the days of the week are allotted towards different types of disputes. They encouraged students to put forward questions and raise doubts. This visit to the court gave everyone an insight into the our Judiciary. It was observed that most of the cases were either postponed due to the parties not being present or simply because of lack of information. The visit was not only an eye-opener into the judiciary system but also deepened our understanding of the subject of law. It is experiences like these that transform inexperienced students into dignified citizens.

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NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The main objectives of National Service Scheme (NSS) are to inculcate in the youth the understanding of the community in which they work and themselves in relation to their community; identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem-solving; develop among themselves a sense of social and civic responsibility; utilize their knowledge in finding practical solutions to individual and community problems; develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities; gain skills in mobilizing community participation; acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitudes; develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters and practice national integration and social harmony.

Keeping in mind the above aims the activities for the year 2015-16 were planned and began from May 2015.

On 2nd May five volunteers participated in the selection process of *Avhan* at M.P.V. Valia College, Borivali. Ashish Pal was selected to participate in *Avhan 2015* to be held at SNDT University, Mumbai.

On 25th May three volunteers attended the conference on Skill Development at Mumabai University.

On 29th May Dr. Sunita Tidke as PO and Ashish Pal as volunteer participated in the *Avhan* camp at SNDT University Mumbai. Dr. Swati Desai visited the camp in the capacity of District coordinator.

On 5th June Dr. Swati Desai and five volunteers participated in the Tree plantation on the occasion of World Environment Day at Kalina.

On 8th June 10 volunteers attended the State level Award function on World Yoga at Churchgate NSS Office. On 17th and 21 June Five volunteers participated in the practice session of Yoga as well as Yoga session at Sports Complex, Kalina.

On 1st July nine volunteers participated in the Tree plantation organised at Keshav Srushti Uttan wherein 150 saplings were planted.

Blood Donation Camp: A Blood Donation Camp was jointly organised by the NSS Unit of our college and Lions Club of Malad-Borivali in the college Gymkhana in association with *Samaj Vikas Adhikari Cooper Hospital*, Juhu. Lion Sharad Ruia, Chairman of Governing Council and Lion Kanahaiyalal G. Saraf, Hon. Sec. of the Governing Council and other Lion members also participated in the camp. 123 units of blood were collected.

Red ribbon club: On 17th September three volunteers participated in peer training at MDACS, Wadala.

Ganpati Bandobast: On 21st and 27th August around 59 NSS volunteers participated in the *Ganpati Immersion Bandobast*. The project was in association with Malad Police Station. Our volunteers helped the police in maintaining discipline, cleanliness and crowd control.

Anaaj Daan: The NSS Unit of Prahladrai Dalmia Lions College and Lions Club of Malad-Borivli jointly organised *Anajdan* and Eye Check up Campaign in which free spectacles were distributed to the people after the eye check up. *Anaj* was distributed to the blind people called through an NGO. They were also provided with breakfast. Dr. Swati Desai, Dr. Rajesh Bombe, Dr.SunitaTidke, Prof. Sachin Bansode, Prof. Rahul Pandya also participated in the event.

Run for Unity: Our students took part in *the Run for Unity* that started at Trident and finished at Marine Lines flyover on 31st October. His Excellency Governor of Maharashtra and the Chief Minister led the volunteers to taking the oath after the run. 16 NSS volunteers of our college attended the programme.

Bharatiya Sanvidhan Din: On 26th November speeches by experts were arranged for NSS volunteers in the college campus. The speakers were Dr. S.V. Chandratre, Vice Principal and Prof. Mahendra Pachhadkar a professor in Law.

World Aids Day: On 1st December the World Aids Day was celebrated in the college by the NSS unit. A Power point presentation was shown to the students to provide information about AIDS. A Street play was performed showing the causes of AIDS the ways to prevent it so that awareness could be created.

Damu Nagar Fire Disaster: On 7th December a fire disaster affected the slums of Damu Nagar, Kandivali wherein more than 2500 huts were destroyed. On 8th December NSS volunteers with Prof. Sachin Bansode, Dr. Rajesh Bombe and other professors visited to affected area and distributed more than 100 vadapavs in the afternoon & vegetable biryani in the evening on same day. The college NSS unit distributed 6 bags of clothes to more than 60 families and vessels to 5 affected families. On 28th December the College distributed 125 tarpaulin of measuring 10 x10 =100 sqft to 125 affected families.

Marathon: On 16 December a marathon was conducted where 20 NSS volunteers participated to show their support towards people suffering from AIDS.

NSS Camp

The Camp was inaugurated at the hands of Mr. Mahendra Thakur, President of *Tantamukti Sanghatana*, Tandulwadi. Every day began with Yoga and Meditation. Volunteers engaged in fieldwork that consisted of construction of *Bandhara* in Tandulwadi, assisting in repairing the Medical Center, assisting in construction of Toilet at Tandulwadi School.

A Socio-economic survey of the village was also conducted. Coupons were distributed to the needy villagers for getting benefit of *Anajdan*. **Day 5**: Distributed coupens to needy villagers for getting benefit of Anajdan. DEPARTMENT OF LIFELONG LEARNING AND EXTENSION (DLLE)

The Department of Life Long Learning & Extension (DLLE) aims to facilitate the sensitization of the students to the socio-cultural realities. The department offers extension work projects encompassing social issues to the students. The Department has a total of 204 students on its roll for the academic year 2015-16.

'Survey of Women's Status' Project: The Department this year enrolled students under extension work project titled 'Survey of Women's Status''. The purpose of this project is to sensitise the students about the problems faced by women & to generate a sense of realization among students to be a contributory factor towards their empowerment.

Our students conducted a survey of women in the age group of 15 - 35 years. They interviewed 25 to 50 women each in the areas chosen under the project. These projects thus provide a forum for exchange of ideas, innovations, amassing knowledge & provides a chance to increase the representative voice of those traditionally under-served & ignored in society.

One Day Mega Medical Check-Up & Distribution Campaign: Our extension students participated in the One Day Mega Medical Check-Up & Distribution Campaign organized by our college at Osarvira- A tribal village in Palghar District wherein they donated clothes, schools bags, notebooks, utensils, toys etc. Two medical practitioners were assisted by our extension students in carrying out the Medical Check – Up Campaign.

Supporting a Cause: Nine extension students - Chauhan Vishal, Jain Dimple, Agrawal Jyoti, Chaurasia Khusboo, PawarVaibhav, Shaikh Zufisha, Shah Shreya, Lohia Navratna and Shah Kajol participated in the Business Fair organised by the Department of to enhance the Entrepreneurship skills of the Students. The entire profit amounting to Rs. 1100/- was donated by these students for the community project.

Social Initiatives undertaken by students

1. Community Service Project at Damu Nagar: an Initiative Of the Disaster Management Cell

Mon, 7 December 2015 – Multiple gas cylinder explosions coupled with gusty winds led to about 2,000 shanties being burnt to the ground hours in a huge fire broke that brokeout at the Damu Nagar slum in Kandivali (East) on this day. The massive fire claimed two lives and rendered thousands homeless.

The Disaster Management Cell of our college immediately swung into action as the news spread through mobile and other social networking sites. The team rushed to the site on 9th December and rendered aid to those affected. The team along with Prof. Rajesh Ruke, Dr. Kiran Mane, Prof. Shami Nimgulkar-Kamble, Prof. Sachin Bansode and Prof. Rajesh Bombe visited the spot and distributed 100 vadapavs to a section of the people affected by the tragedy.

The call for assistance by the team reached out to the student and teaching fraternity. They responded by donating utensils and clothing to the affected people.

On 15th December the disaster management team along with NSS volunteers and Students' Council visited Damu Nagar and distributed six bags of clothing and three bags of utensils to more than 100 affected people.

Though the aid rendered may be miniscule in its effect, the fact remains that the efforts put forth by our students got them sensitised to the problems of others and taught them to respond to the needy in distress.

A survey was conducted by our students with the help of our teachers with regards to the help required by the people affected by the fire. The interviews and survey revealed that their shanties being burnt, they required tarpaulins to build them up again. They were receiving aid from neighbouring people and political leaders in other ways but the required their shelter to be rebuilt even if they were temporary. So after discussion a total of Rs. 19,000/- was collected and on 22nd December 125 tarpaulins (10x10 =100 sq.ft. each i.e. 12500 /- sq.ft.) were distributed thereby housing 125 families albeit in a temporary fashion.

On 1st January 2016 the 'Talent Hunter' team of our college distributed 125 bags of wheat flour of 4kg each to the affected people. The money was generated by our students by putting up a stall at the Damia Lions Utsav that raised Rs. 12,000. This was an initative taken up by Nikhil Jain and group.

2. Community Project at Tribal village

Osarvira, Palghar District:

On the recommendation of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), DLLE, NSS, NCC and Students' Council, in continuation of the best practice started last year, conducted A One Day Mega Medical Check – Up and Distribution Campaign at a tribal village named Osarvira in Palghar District nearly 102 kms from Mumbai on Wednesday, 2ndFebruary, 2016 along with 40 committed student volunteers and 11 teachers.

A glimpse of activities conducted:

Donation of Footwear to School Children:

The observation and the survey conducted at this village made our students realize the fact that school children of this village went about their chores without any footwear. Footwear, a necessity for us all was not available to these school children. Our students realized that on one hand we city dwellers do not bat an eyelid in spending on pedicures and foot massages and on the other hand there are these tiny feet of village children who have to endure the strong heat, thorns and infections as they go to school bare feet. After realizing these hardships faced by school children from a pre-camp survey, our teachers decided to donate footwear to 300 school children of three Zilla Parishad Schools. This step was highly appreciated by the school authorities and the smiling faces of the children drenched the souls of teachers with a sense of fulfillment.

Distribution of clothes, stationary, toys, utensils and food items:

To take is the nature of animals. To give and take is the nature of human beings. To give without taking is the nature of the Divine. Through giving, we grow in divinity. Kept to ourselves, our happiness will become stagnant and fade away. To increase our joy we must share joy with others. Seva connects us to others and makes them a part of us. The barriers dissolve that separate our happiness from their happiness.

Around 300 Zilla Parishad school children from standard I to VII were distributed notebooks, Pens, Pencils, Erasers, toys and writing pads. 250 tribal women, men, children were distributed clothes which were collected from teachers and students of our college. IQAC would especially like to acknowledge the DLLE students who donated the entire profit that they made during the Business Fair organized by Department of BMS.

Medical Camp:

The camp lasted throughout the day. Around 500 patients were treated. The college roped in services of two doctors - Dr. Rajesh Bombe and Dr. Prajvalit Sonkamble to conduct the medical camp. Women primarily suffered from backache as they had to fetch water from long distance. The men were found to be suffering with health issues related to heavy drinking. Most of the children suffered from severe problem of scabies. Students were given ointments, soaps and medicines free of cost. A demonstration on "How to wash hands" was given by our teachers to signify the importance of cleanliness and personal hygiene. All the patients were given free general medicines and those who were found to be having larger health issues were advised to visit the general hospital at the earliest.

Donation of spiritual books:

Education becomes holistic when spirituality becomes the epicenter of knowledge transmission. Keeping this in mind, our teachers donated spiritual books like-BhimrupiStotra, VidhyartyancheRamdas and YuvakachaSfurtiNirzar by Samarth Ramdas to school children.

3. Reaching out ... :

"A candle loses nothing by lighting another candle." In other words, be willing to help others and share your knowledge and insights with others who may benefit.

This is the philosophy that we believe & in its pursuit students of BMS under the guidance of their teachers regularly visited the NGO 'Prayas: Providing education to the street children of Mumbai' and made contribution their by teaching, playing and sharing knowledge with them.

As a part of our social initiative the students of TYBMS put up a stall of articles made by the special students of the NGO helping the mentally challenged students and made a contribution of Rs. 6000/- out of the sale proceeds in the Business Fair organized on 12th February, 2016 by the Department of BMS in the college.

Best Practice No.1

1. Title of the Practice:

Learning by doing: Internship by students of BMS

2. Goal:

To expand the depth and breadth of academic learning of our students Facilitate student learning in the 'real world'

3. The Context:

The present curriculum gives no space for hands on training unless the institute goes out of its way to provide for such experiences. The syllabus with its emphasis on theory and written mode of examination provides little space for experiential learning.

Thus the basic idea was to allow our students to gain experience, develop skills, make connections, strengthen their resumes, learn about a field, and assess their interest and abilities.

After a thorough research companies were shortlisted and teachers convinced these companies to assist us in the internship program.

Students were helped in creating their CVs and trained in appearing for interview

- 5. **Evidence of Success**: Forty Students were picked by various companies for internships.
- 6. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** The teachers had to approach industries and convince them that internships would help them tap talent and in turn contribute to the education process.

The task of connecting to the HR departments of various companies was an arduous task.

Soft skills and communication skills on the part of the teachers and students were the only resources required.

Most of the children suffered from severe problem of scabies. Students were given ointments, soaps and medicines free of cost. A demonstration on "How to wash hands" was given by our teachers to signify the importance of cleanliness and personal hygiene. All the patients were given free general medicines and hose who were found to be having larger health issues were advised to visit the general hospital at the earliest. 3) Donations of spiritual books: Education becomes holistic when spirituality becomes the epicentre of knowledge transmission. Keeping this in mind, our teachers donated spiritual books like-BhimrupiStotra, Vidhyartyanche Ramdas and Yuvakacha Sfurti Nirzar by Samarth Ramdas to school children. 4) Donation of Footwear to School Children: Things that we consider as "normal" are beyond reach of many Things as simple as footwear which appears trivial But is very important Let us try walking on burning roads in the heat, or dusty terrains with thorns We will not be able to sustain. Such is the pain that the deprived undergo and such is the terrible nature of their hardships. Footwear is a source of great solace to their feet and minds.
